Since 2018, they have embarked on a new project with actor Heikko Deutschmann, including a memorable concert for the Ruhrfestspiele Recklinghausen that showcased the music and writings of Kurt Tucholsky.

Invitations to perform at prestigious music festivals worldwide, such as the Schleswig Holstein Festival, Rheingau Festival, and MDR Musiksommer, are a testament to their reputation.
